Executive Summary

Introduction:

Established in 1987, Sri SaradaNiketan College of Science for Women, Karur, a three decade old is affiliated to Bharathidasan University, Tiruchirapalli follows the curriculum designed and developed by the University. The University has adopted Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) under Semester pattern. The college is offering U.G, P.G, Pre-Doctoral (Commerce and Tamil) and Research Courses leading to Ph.D(Tamil). The college has a Dean exclusively for Academic Curriculum Affairs and C.O.E for conducting (Continuous Internal Assessment) CIA besides Dean - R&D, Dean - T&D, Dean – Students and Dean-ISR & Extension.

Criteria wise Summary

Curricular Aspects :

Curriculum is planned by the parent University and implemented by the faculty members judiciously. Academic Delivery report is maintained by every teacher for accountability of syllabus completion i.e Academic Interaction Record. Class Teachers serve as Counselors for each class. After first Continuous Internal Assessment slow learners are identified and under Special Care to Slow Learners remedial classes are conducted and special cares to advanced learners are given with Additional Reading Materials. CIA and other programmes are conducted as per the schedule given in the college Annual calendar. During University examinations, Faculty members verify Question Papers and give report to the Principal in case of breach of the syllabi if any. The syllabus prescribed by the University covers the cross cutting issues namely Gender studies (in final year) and Climate Change in Environmental Education (first year) as Non Major Elective papers in the curriculum. Being a women's' college through the Women Cell, the faculty members, Women Police officials, legal experts and the counsellors frequently interacts and address the students on Women Safety, Women Harassment and Protection of Children from Sexual Offences. The college has Exnora to create the awareness on the Reduce, Reuse and Recycle. Awareness programmes are also initiated by NSS, YRC and RRC which extensively carry out activities for environmental protection and ecological preservation. The IQAC through the social initiative programme includes lecture workshops on professional ethics and human rights. Structured feedback is received from the stakeholders on the syllabus provided by the University.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation :

Student Enrolment is done as per the guidelines of the Government of Tamilnadu GO as issued by the Director of Collegiate Education and the Parent University –Bharathidasan University, Tiruchirapalli. The eligibility criteria and Community based quota are strictly followed. Students are made to revise HSC subjects before starting the regular syllabus of the University curriculum so that to avoid imbalance in the class population. To mould the children admitted in the college, need based orientation, Bridge, Motivation and Confidence Building courses are conducted for two to five days at every semester beginning. Slow learners are given easier notes and simple textbooks. English communication courses are conducted to create effective communication skill. Peer learning is encouraged in the college where meritorious students help the slow learners. The inter-disciplinary seminars help teachers to keep abreast of happenings in the new frontiers. NET/SET Free orientation classes are conducted by/to the faculty members as well as the PG and M.Phil, students. Internal Assessment is made mandatory and confidentiality is maintained in question paper setting, examination hall and allocation of Hall Superintendents. Academic Audit through external experts for all the Departments is conducted. The COE cell ensures the systematic conduct of the examination in the institution by conducting meetings. The grievances of the students related to learning and other issues are analysed and clarified through the Grievance Redress Cell of the institution. An academic calendar is prepared in advance with the details of working days, schedule of examinations and the major regular events.

Research, Innovations and Extension :

Institution generates the resources for research and allied programmes from the Government funding agencies/institutions and also get assistance from the management to all the departments to conduct research oriented projects, workshops, seminars, and other related programmes to motivate the students and faculty members. RRRLF and UGC have sponsored funds to conduct a National event on the Digital Library and to carry out minor research projects in the faculty of Tamil and Commerce. The institution through R&D cell has created basic ecosystem for innovations including incubation of the students towards research initiative on creation and transfer of knowledge. The students and faculty are exposed to the advanced level of knowledge and skills through participation and presentation of papers in the conferences, seminars, symposia, workshops, and academic events on the college and off the college programmes by students and teachers. Few have made publication of papers in the Journals and Proceedings of the conferences. Teachers participate in Faculty Development Programmes and Orientation courses organized by other colleges and our college. The institution had organised workshops for girl students in Schools at District level for conservation and promotion and development of Indian culture sponsored by Ministry of Culture, Government of India under the auspices of Vidhya Bharti Sarskriti Shiksha Sansthan, Sanskrit Bhawan, Kurukshetra for two years (during 2016-17 and 2017-18) on the topic - workshop on Awarenesss Preservation and Development of Indian Culture and Heritage, Development of Scientific Temperament, Yoga and its role in healthy human life and Indian Ethos.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources :

The infrastructure policy is planned and practiced by realising the vision and objectives of the institution. With the available infrastructure (sufficient class rooms, equipped laboratories, established computer centre, sports ground) the institution strives to provide ample opportunities for the intellectual, cultural and physical development of young girls. Seminar halls are provided with LCD and Public Addressing System. The players represent and display their talents at the intra collegiate, district, inter-collegiate levels organised by the University. Library supports stakeholders by providing available information resources relevant to curriculum and enrichment. The library with IQAC is constantly engaged in providing professional and career development opportunities for the staff members and the students. College provides Wi-Fi facility for reference, curriculum planning, development, delivery, CIA proceedings (question papers, submission of marks for tests, assignments etc.,) and Conferences. The nature of updating was increased from 512 Kbps to 10 Mbps. E-content development and management by way of capturing video-audio recording for lecture capturing system is in nuptial stage. Bar coded library ticket system for students and staff is planned. Few

effective practices followed are the Prohibition of sub lending of library books and cards, Reimbursement of cost of books in case of irrecoverable loss, Annual maintenance by sorting books/magazines for binding, Insect proof/termite proof maintenance facility, Display of latest arrivals (Books & Journals) are in practice. Campus is provided with Fire extinguishers in the buildings/laboratories/office/library with 24x7 Power generators for college and hostel. Campus is Water, Noise, Soil, Air Pollution free.

Student Support and Progression :

The institution arranges and offers scholarships and free ships from the government and private agencies. Student capability enhancement and development schemes are rightly provided to the students. The amicable students at UG level, who perform the best in academics, co-curricular, extra-curricular and cultural activities, are earmarked by the HODs assignments in the student council and academic forums in the Staff Council. After enough deliberations, executive members of the College Union and its allied Associations are finalized. Among the best students selected from each discipline based on the criteria formed by IQAC, one final year PG student is unanimously selected as Chairwoman and one final year UG student is unanimously selected as Secretary. Apart from the College Union and its Allied Associations, the Students representatives are also placed in IQAC. Institutional Social Responsibility, Extension and Development activities are common in the college. Students further help in the effective conduct of sports events. The institution has a transparent mechanism for the timely redressal of grievances by the committee. Student council and functional committees bear the representation of students. The college has formal and informal systems to establish continuous and healthy interaction with the out-gone students. Alumnae are in constant contact with the college through alumna association, through the respective department heads and members of monasteries too. The outcome of the mentor-mentee system, the cordial relationship bred between the teachers and students during the course of study make the alumnae to approach the teachers in all endeavours, instantaneous domestic issues and clarifications.

Governance, Leadership and Management :

The institution with the Primary Governing Body - The College Committee meets annually and suggests the instantaneous values and monitors progress. The Secondary Governing body - the staff council with HODs meets frequently and paves way for innovative measures. The Tertiary governance body -with five different Deans execute all the day to day affairs systematically with friction free functioning. The governance is divided in to five facets namely Dean- COE and Curriculum, Dean - Training and Development, Dean -Research, Planning and Development, Dean - Institutional Social Responsibility, Extension and Development and Dean - Students welfare, discipline and Deputy Warden. The annual calendar is a ready reckoner for all events. Various functional committees are in vogue with Principal as the Chairperson along members from IQAC, Dean of respective cell, Senior faculty members, UG and PG students from Arts, Science and Commerce. Above system monitors Admission, Library, Sports, Hostel, Appeal and Grievance Redressal, Students welfare, Anti-ragging, Women Cell, Examination, Research, Finance, Alumna etc., all the members of the college collectively involve and own responsibility. The organogram depicts the decentralization and participative management of the institution. The Principal holds the academic leadership and the Secretary of the college holds the administrative leadership. Quality policy is deployed through effective administration and management, continual quality improvement of the faculty and upgradation of infrastructure and facilities to the extent possible. IQAC serves as a nodal unit of the institution for augmenting all quality related activities and ensures effective performance of academic and administrative commitments.

Institutional Values and Best Practices :

The institution provides a befitting security, safety, counseling and required physical requirements to justify the gender sensitivity. College campus is provided with 24x7 security with CCTV. Parents are provided with ID card for their entry into the institution. Hostel students are accompanied by the parents or nominated guardians for both ways from hostel and residence. The students and faculty members have uniform system and ID cards helps in identity, safety and security. Class teachers serve as mentor and counselor. A non-resident shelter (NRSS) is provided for day students and a common rest room is provided in the hostel. A healthy practice is adherence of different coloured uniform Sari wear (Green-UG, Pink-PG, Blue– Predoctoral) by the students.

1.Curricular Aspects

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Answer:

Established in 1987, Sri Sarada Niketan College of Science for Women, Karur a three decade old is affiliated to Bharathidasan University, Tiruchirapalli follows the curriculum designed and developed by the University. The University has adopted Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) under Semester pattern. The college is offering U.G, P.G, Pre-Doctoral and Research Courses leading to Ph.D in Tamil. The college has Dean exclusively for Academic Curriculum Affairs & C.O.E for conducting examinations for CIA.

Syllabus of each course paper is divided into five units and total syllabus is divided into 3 parts for 3 CIAs. The syllabus is divided for three CIA are in the following pattern: I-U.G & I-P.G : 1+2+2 and II-U.G, III-U.G & II-P.G : 2+2+1 to ensure completion of syllabi and to provide stress free dosage for each test series. Academic Delivery report is prepared by every teacher for accountability of syllabus completion during every semester by way of mainteance of Academic Interaction Record (AIR).

Well planned and Documented Process:

Syllabi for each paper in each semester are allocated to the staff members after getting their willingness and based on the expertise they have. It is decided in the department level meeting well in advance before starting each semester. Class teachers are Counselors and serve dually as Mentors for each class. They maintain the profile of all students with a system called Personal Parental Care System. After CIA - I, slow learners are identified on the basis of their performance and under Special Care to Slow Learners (SCSL) programme special remedial classes are conducted by the respective course teachers in the extra college hours and for those smart stduents with Special Care to Advanced Learners (SCAL) programme care and helps are given with appropriate guidance and additional reading materials. The counsellors maintain SCSL register and it is periodically reviewed by IQAC and Principal for updation..

Continous Internal Assessment (CIA) and other programmes are conducted as per the schedule given in the college Annual calendar for every year and AIR is submitted to the Principal to keep record of every activities conducted by the faculty in the department for every semester. The question paper pattern of the CIA is in coordination with the University pattern. The curriculum delivery both theory and practical syllabi are ensured well in advance before the respective end semester examination. The conduct of model examination for the entire syllabus before the university examination is in practice which helps the students to face the final examination with confience.

During university examinations Faculty members of the respective courses verify Question Papers and give report to the Controller of Examination of the University through the Principal (in case of breach of the syllabi by asking questions from out of syllabi and also for typographical error or clarifications if any). A pre-examination review meet of all faculty members of each department are conducted to understand the status of completion of curriculum and to plan completion or revision of the syllabus.

13.1 Institution integrates cross- cutting issues relevant to Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values and Professional Ethics into the Curriculum

Answer:

The institution is systematically discharging its curriculum with accountability as per the guidelines of the parent university. The parent university through its Syndicate after having realised in the society and on representation by the stakeholders introduced vital and sensitive issues in the form of extra academic facets and same are formulated with the Board of Studies expertise to deliver the same to the youth. Accordingly the Institution integrates the cross-cutting issues relevant to Gender, Environment, Values and Ethics very much indispensable for the current generation of students. The syllabus prescribed by the University covers the cross cutting issues namely Climate change in environmental education (in the first year) and Gender studies (in final year) as Non Major Elective papers in the curriculum.

a. Gender :

"An educated lady invariably forms an educated family" which in turn forms an Ideal nation. Keeping this in view, the college was started to provide Man Making Education to rural girls. Being the womens' college, through the Women Cell, the faculty members, the Women Police officials, the women legal experts and counselors frequently interacts with the students on Women Safety, Women Harassment and Protection of Children from Sexual Offences.

b. Climate Change and Environmental Education :

The college has Exnora cell to create the awareness on the 3 R's namely Reduce, Reuse and Recycle, among students on environment, different types of pollution, impact of deforestation, afforestation and judicious management of environment by appropriate conservation measures. The campus is having a Vermi-composting yard to produce vermicasts, a natural organic manure. The campus dairy helps in maintaining vermiculture and organic farming. The agricultural farms in the campus are using the earthworm based fortified organic manures to the tune of 70% avoiding inorganic synthetic fertilizers. Awareness programmes are conducted periodically by NSS, YRC which extensively carry out activities for environmental protection and ecological preservation.

c. Human Rights:

The IQAC through the social initiative programme includes lecture workshops on professional ethics and human rights. Consumer Forum has organized seminars on the consumer's right. Women lawyers are invited to enlighten about women's rights. Individual Professional ethics towards Institutional ethics and social ethics and its importance is harmoniously blended and infused to the students by way of synchronising the Head, the Heart and the Hand. The parent University Integrates periodically the cross cutting issues and upgrade the curriculum content judiciously to satisfy the stakeholders. Being the women educational institution and run by the monastries with ideal vision and mission, above values and issues are ideally integrated and infused to the young women children every day with utmost care not on examination point of view but on enriching the students with Principle, Practice towards Perfection. The institution beyond the curriculum issued by the University gives life training to the inmates by inculcating individual self awareness and essential social awareness. The IQAC of the institution earmark the students representation for the various functional committees to perform their role and responsibilities ensures the professional ethics with the youth.

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2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

- Students are made to revise +2 (Higher Secondary Course) subjects before starting the regular syllabus of the University curriculum so that to avoid imbalanced understanding.
- An evaluation test is conducted on the essential aspects with the first semester freshers which are very much essential and linking the University syllabi.
- subsequently the students are bridged with the school and college curriculum in a bilingual way there by devevlop self confidence.
- The counsellor also assesses the students' needs in terms of knowledge through the marks scored by the students in the Higher Secondary (qualifying) examinations
- Students of BA English and BBA are sufficiently briefed with the basic requirements on English, Arithmetics and Accountancy.
- Similarly sufficient support has been given to the computer science students who have not studied the computer science in their HSC.
- Advanced learners are identified through class tests and encouraged to participate in the student- seminars, workshops and intra and inter-collegiate competitions at different levels to present papers in Regional/University/State/National Level seminars and to write articles in the magazines/journals/proceedings.
- In order to mould the children admitted in the college, need based orientation, Bridge,Motivation and Confidence Building courses are conducted for two to three days at every semester beginning. The first few internal tests and classroom dynamics help the teachers to identify the students' needs. The strengths and weaknesses of the students are identified and a suitable coaching is provided to such students, which includes remedial teaching, soft skills course, spoken English course etc.
- The HOD, class teachers-Counselors and subject teachers interact on a one to one basis with the students.
- The advanced learners are identified from CIA and they are guided appropriately with Additional Reading Materials (ARM). Advanced learners are made to apply for external meets and competitions. While on attending conferences they observe, share and develop the skills and values essential for higher studies and placement.
- \circ Book bank facility is available for the financially weak students.
- Departmental seminars are organized, where the students are asked to present their assignments to monitor the in-depth understanding of the subject and also to motivate towards higher education, employment and research.
- Students, who have good academics and interest are encouraged to participate in the oncampus and off-campus academic meetings/seminars/workshops to develop their presentation/research skill.
- The students who are economically weak and are at a higher risk of dropout are given counselling, which has shown positive results.
- Slow learners are given easier notes and simple textbooks.
- English communication courses are conducted to create effective communication skill.
- Slow learners are identified immediately after CIA I by the subject teachers and remedial coaching is provided to them as per the convenience of the students and teachers.
- Peer learning is encouraged in the college where meritorious students help the slow learners.
- Fast learners are instructed/guided and counselled by the HOD/Principal over assembly meetings to undergo dual degree courses of their choice under distance learning programme.

23 Teaching- learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Answer:

- Slow learner centric and advanced learner centric approach is the priority given by the counsellor and course teachers.
- Being the rural college and as students are largely from Tamil medium, every measure is to avoid complex amongst the stduents.
- Book Bank Scheme, SCSL, Advanced Reading Materials (ARM) for Advanced Learners and ICT enabled teaching methods are introduced by the college to enhance the student learning.
- Industrial visits are organized for the students to understand the implementation of the theory to practice.
- The college conducts seminars and workshops on the thrust areas of the respective discipline.
- The inter-disciplinary seminars help teachers to keep abreast of happenings in the new frontiers.
- Seminars/Workshops on Research Methodology allied thrust programmes help to inculcate research culture in the students before getting employment.
- Industrial visits and hands on training helps to impart practical knowledge that interface academic and employment prospective.
- General awareness regarding soft skills development, human rights add to the existing curriculum enabling the students to face the competitive market.
- It is conducted every year to equip students with soft skills in order to improve their personality and prepare them for the future world of allurement and intense competition. They receive training on communication skills, interview techniques, seminar presentations, leadership qualities, group discussions etc.
- Mock interviews and group discussions are organized to prepare the students for the job market.
- General awareness sessions are conducted by the teachers for one to one interaction with the students. Quiz practice mode, role play, group discussion, debates, competitions etc., are practiced for the promotion of interactive learning skill.
- Group projects, models, workshops, software development competition, industrial and institutional visits are in practice for collaborative learning skill.
- To promote Independent learning skill is promoted by Student seminar, Oratorical/essay competition, Case study analysis, home assignment, Seminar paper presentation/publication in the proceedings and journals, internships and paper reviews teachers motivate the students for self-study.

Project based learning helps the students to develop research skills, organising and planning capability as they have to search for the literature and plan the methods to achieve the obectives. Internet based learning exposes the faculty and students to update their field of research and academics.Inter departmental forum meetings promote the understanding of integrated academics and research and helps in blending the different disciplines for applied research towards innovative contribution to the society. Students of this institution at the UG level all have to peform a group project which is beyond the University requirement. The performance is amazing and it forms an evaluating tool for realising the self and social awareness commitment with the student children. Case study analysis is being followed which helps the candidates to probe into the methods of management, commerce, trade and business.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Answer:

- The five Units of the syllabus are judiciously divided and the students are exposed to three CIAs proportionately. For the first years the dosage for CIA will be lesser and for others it will 2+2+1.
- \circ For the first semester of UG and PG the units will be 1+2+2 because of student heterogeneity and late admission.
- CIA portions and ADR are audited by the Principal and Deans concerned.
- The CIA questions before submission to the CIA Dean, the faculty members have to ensure the correctness with the countersign of their HODs. CIA questions have to bear the sign of question paper setter (QPS) and HOD concerned.
- The CIA questions of all departments were made to academic audit by external expert and the quality of the same is monitoried by the IQAC.
- The answers scripts too are reviewed by the respective HOD for discrepancies if any.
- Internal Assessment is made mandatory and confidentiality is maintained in question paper setting, examination hall arrangement and allocation of Hall Superintendents.
- Assignment on different topics is mandatory and have to be submitted in defined timeline
- For the UG and PG students Seminar component is there and seminar is conducted and the marks are included for final consolidation and the same will be useful for placement interview and higher education.
- The valued answer scripts of CIA are distributed in front of all the students and discrepancies and lapses if any, are redressed immediately by the course teacher and only then the marks are entered in the CIA register.
- The final CIA marks in the consolidated table are verifed before entering in the website portal of University Controller of Examinations.
- The academic performance is monitored by students performance through, class tests, assignments, class seminars, CIA, group discussions and other presentations.
- Academic Audit through external experts for all the Departments are conducted (with defined Syllabi, lesson plan, CIA questions and Model Examinations questions).
- At the beginning of the academic year, the Heads of the departments orient the fresher's to the features of CBCS, internal and external evaluation, marks for University distinction and University ranks.
- A copy of the course papers/detailed curriculum at every semester beginning is made available to all the students.
- The evaluation process includes Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) for 25% of marks and semester examination for 75% of marks.
- Prior intimation of the internal test (CIA) dates is made transparent through Academic Calender.
- A model or revision test is made compulsory for all the students. Those who excel in the model, the CIA marks will be audited amended towards achieving distinction and University Ranks.
- For slow learners and those gone on OD, special tests are given on request and on recommendation of Counsellors, DPE, NSS POs.
- For repeat test of CIA a separate question will be constructed.
- The required number of words/passage is instructed and expected from the candidates for various sections of the CIA.

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

- The conduct of CIAs is as per the academic calendar and made transparent. In extreme situations for amendment of dates and schedule of papers the advance notifications through Notice boards and circulars are in practice.
- Time lines for completion of syllabus, submission of CIA questions, printing of question papers, the preparation of answer booklets, display of duty chart, Display off hall allocation, display of hall superintendents, issue of answer scripts for correction to the respective course teachers, issue of valued answer scripts to the students, entry of CIA marks in the CIA register, forwarding of the marks to the Principal through CIA cell are maintained with confidentiality wherever required. Each test is phased and conducted with sufficient space period for the teachers to teach and students to learn and present. It is decided by the examination committee under the Dean of curriculum and COE-CIA
- As regard to variety, three CIAs and one Model examination is prescribed. With regard to frequency each test has a space of 30 days.
- As regard to questions the pattern has three sections with definition type, short essay and extended essay type.
- Depending upon the commitments/unexpected reasons in the respective semesters the inter test period may be amended with postponement or advancement without any inconvenice to the students.
- Institution has a Controller of Examination to hold CIA in a befitting manner to ensure effective implementation of evaluation procedures. The institute strictly follows the university norms and guidelines for conducting semester examinations.
- The COE cell ensures the systematic conduct of the examination in the institution by conducting meetings at appropriate times.
- Retests for improvement of marks for Slow Learners, OD candidates and for those whose reasons are justified in terms of health, demise in the family, marriage and other issues.
- Students are encouraged to write special tests if they get low marks in the CIA with the knowledge of the parent through the HOD and counsellor.
- Papers on languages (Part I and Part II), on Major subjects, Allied Subjects, Non-major Electives, skilled based electives (Part III) are fixed on variable dates to provide balanced time for the students so that their preparations will not disturbed.
- In extreme cases of Sick or who went on OD provision is made available to have the average of two tests as the final CIA marks.
- The assessment of papers at the UG level are made with the scheme of valuation which confirms the uniformity and consistency in valuation.
- For PG, the valuations are based on the essential requirement for the question with basic and applied values. In addition the comparative outlook is made to grade broadly the efficiency of the candidate on their presentation, flow, clarity, coherance, critical thinking, collaborative interdisciplinary application towards society and Research.
- Provision is also available and made known to students and faculty members that in case of disparity or report of partiality the valued paper by a particular teacher may also be valued by the HOD or other faculty as decided by the HOD.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Answer:

The grievances of the students related to examination and other issues did not arise. If so the committee will analyse and clarify through the Grievance Redress Cell of the institution. However regarding the time requirement for each test, light and fan facility, stationery requirement, water requirement, exceptional requirements for specific issues are taken care off as and when arises. Request for the movement time from block to block and break time after the test is also considered with concern. The Examination committee and Appeal & Grievance Redressal Committee with the Principal as the Chairperson along with members of faculty and students under the guidance of IQAC the grievances are suitably taken care off. The members of the committee comprises of senior faculty members and students representations from humanities and Science faculties. The even representation of faculty members and students helps in

sharing the grievances democratically and serious issues did not took place.

At the college level:

- The valued answer scripts are distributed in front of all the students and discrepancies and lapses if any are redressed immediately by the course teacher and then the marks are entered in the CIA register.
- The final CIA marks in the consolidated table are verified and signed by the students before entering in the University COE Portal provided for the submission of consolidated final CIA marks. On the day of distribution of CIA answer scripts if a particular student is absent she on her return (within three days) to college has to check back the answer sheets and confirm the valuation made aQby the course teacher.
- The students are made clear to ask/clarify for the award of mark for the particular question in case of difference in award amongst the peers. This is taken with healthy and honest understanding.
- The students are made to understand the issues and to justify the genuine grievance while representing.
- The members of the committee are in cordial understanding and ideal relationship with the stduents and hence the occurrence of grievances are remote.

At the University level:

- After the declaration of University results, aggrieved student can apply for revaluation within stipulated time notified by the University.
- The out of syllabus questions in the University examinations are immediately intimated to the Controller of Examination in order to have a care on those papers for some relaxation in the evaluation/award of marks.
- In some cases, the declaration of results for examination reappearance and revaluation of already appeared paper if delayed, on special conditions for the progression to higher education or for placement the results are declared with speedy action procedures.

2.5.4 The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE

Answer:

- An academic calendar is prepared in advance with the details of working days, schedule of examinations (CIA i.e. CIE and University Semester) and the major regular events.
- Each faculty member submits a lecture plan at the beginning of the semester to the Principal. Accordingly the portions for three CIE are completed with the defined and declared formula (1+2+2 for I semester of UG and PG and 2+2+1 for all other semesters)
- Teachers record the routine works during the college time in the Teachers Academic Interaction Record (AIR) and it is submitted to the Principal weekly that forms accountability.
- Dates and details of Continuous Internal Assessment Examinations (CIA/CIE), class tests, quiz, assignments, model examinations, seminars and progress report to parents are given in the calendar. The Principal periodically meets all faculty members at the beginning and at the end of every semester, in addition to intermittent need based meetings, to monitor the progression.
- CIA, model examinations, practical examinations and University examinations are displayed on the general and departmental notice boards well in advance.
- Time lines for completion of syllabus, submission of CIA questions, printing of question papers, the preparation of answer booklets, display of duty chart, Display off hall allocation, display of hall superintendents, issue of answer scripts for correction to the respective course teachers, issue of valued answer scripts to the students, entry of CIA marks in the CIA register, forwarding of the marks to the Principal through CIA cell are maintained with confidentiality wherever

• required. Each test is phased and conducted with sufficient space period for the teachers to teach and students to learn and present. It is decided by the examination committee under the Dean of curriculum and COE-CIA.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

Answer:

The institution is affiliated to Bharathidasan University, Tiruchirapalli. The programme outcome and programme specific outcomes are in line with the University. #### **3.2 Innovation Ecosystem**

## 3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations including incubation centre and other initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

#### Answer:

Though our college has not received any funds from the state or central funding agencies, financial assistance by the management is given to the departments to conduct research oriented conferences, workshops, seminars, and other related programmes to motivate the students and faculty members. Each department of the college invites reputed experts from various fields for their academic forum meetings as resource person and provides a platform to accomplish updated knowledge with reference to their current research and development. Students are motivated to carry out individual and group projects by the final year UG students which is beyond the university requirement. The management and staff give full support in planning, guidance, submission and presentation in the conferences too. Majority of the faculty members and students have participated and presented papers in research programmes. Orientation courses conducted in the institution enhance the skills and knowledge base of the faculty and students.

Library, Laboratory instruments and equipments are adequately available for the smooth progress of students and staff in research. Information and Communication Technology (ICT) facility is made available to the students and faculty members. The competitions like debate, elocution, essay writing and short story writing enhance their power of critical thinking. The stated policy of the institution is to produce brand building products like natural fertilizer (Vermi composting), phenyle, soap oil and goodwill earning by utilizing available expertise of its faculty and students. Extracurricular activities like Rangoli, floral decorations with flowers and petals and cultural programs encourage students to exhibit their innate artistic talent and skills. Teachers use innovative methods for classroom teaching. Student enrichment activities consisting of guest lectures, industrial, educational visits, field visits, soft skills and interview skill, seminars enhance their employability. Students are accompanied by staff for the industrial visits and educational tours. This widens the learning horizon of both students and teachers. Self employment being one among the important solutions to unemployment today the concept of education has come to include not only imparting of knowledge but also employability. This purpose of education cannot be met just with the syllabus prescribed by the University. Hence, the college supplements it with basic research and vocational training courses in Tailoring, Handicrafts like Woollen Works, Crochet Wire Knitting, Fur Doll Making, Bouquet Making, Oil Painting, Yogasana, Music, Dance, Spoken Sanskrit, Library and Information Science course. - 1. Every year in the month of January, the college students celebrate Pongal festival. The public from Neighborhood communities are supported and strengthened by our institution through camp activities. NSS organize special camps and help them in all possible ways.
- 2. The NSS Unit establish good rapport with the village panchayat leaders, women ward members, SHG women leaders, senior students of the village to list various activities/services/requirements essential for the villages towards Social (harmony, unity in diversity),Economical (energy & water),Medical (personal and environmental hygiene), Ethical (prohibition, Non-violent society) and Academic (compulsory literacy, insisting basic education and adult education) requirements of the society.In all these events, Village women's participation helps a lot in achieving the target of activities planned.
- 3. Awareness Programmes on Voting, Rainwater Harvesting, and Dengue Fever are conducted as part of extension activity towards ideal citizenship, environmental and health facets.
- 4. Sakthi Pooja and Sirappu Vazhipadu (Special Congregation Prayer) are conducted for the improvement of mental health and wealth of the faculty and students.
- 5. The institution had organised workshops for girl students in Schools at district level for conservation and promotion and development of Indian culture sponsored by Ministry of Culture, Government of India under the auspices of Vidhya Bharti Sarskriti Shiksha Sansthan, Sanskrit Bhawan, Kurukshetra for two years (during 2016-17 and 2017-18) on the topic workshop on Awarenesss Preservation and Development of Indian Culture and Heritage, Development of Scientific Temperament, Yoga and its role in healthy human life and Indian Ethos.

Yes. The institution has adequate facilities. The infrastructural policy of the college is determined by envisioning the goals and visions of the institution. The requirements of the students are assessed in advance and the decisions are taken accordingly. Through this infrastructure, the institution strives to provide ample opportunities for the intellectual, cultural and physical development of young girls. The Department name itself is self-explanatory viz. Physical Education, Sports Science and Yoga. The campus is free from all types of pollution with a large ground for 200 metres track and same is optimally used for Hand Ball game too. The 200 metres track is well defined and marked with cement mark boundaries and it is being used by the students. The same field is used for the Ceremonial March past for Sports day celebration for the march out of NSS, YRC, RRC and Various houses of sports women. Along with it is long jump pit is also rightly used by the athletic candidates. Volley Ball court is available and it is recently renovated. A well-defined Kho-Kho court and kabadi court are available adjacently for the optimal utilization of the physical space. Provision for indoor games like chess and carom are also available. For the practice of cultural activities and competitions the institution is having a multipurpose hall meant for morning assembly, public addressing, practice of yoga, and prayer. The multipurpose hall is having a huge stage for the performers to practice the cultural-traditional-academic programmes in a befitting manner. The entire campus is green with lush growth of herbs, shrubs, trees, ornamental flowering plants. The

seminar hall is provided with LCD and Public Addressing System (PAS) and it is optimally and effectively used by our students and also from other stakeholders. By using these resources, our students excel to the reasonable and commendable level in basic sports activities. The players represent and display their talents at the district, zonal, University and state level. As the students are coming from far away villages they could not spare their time in the evening and morning hours for extra coaching. However the schedule is made in the time table and in the last forty minutes every student of the college is made to play some game once or twice in a week. By this mechanism the entire ground and all physical spaces are effectively and optimally utilized.



#### 6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

The Tertiary governance body comprising of teaching and non-teaching staff through five different Deans execute all the day to day affairs for systematic planning and friction free functioning. The governance is divided in to five facets namely Dean- COE (CIA) and Curriculum, Dean - Training and Development, Dean – Research, Planning and Development, Dean – Institutional Social Responsibility, Extension and Development and Dean - Students welfare, discipline and Deputy Warden. Under each dean there are Cell Coordinators as functionaries for various duties.

The annual calendar is a ready reckoner for all events. It includes schedule of admission time line, examination time line, teaching time line, National festivals, National days, International days,

conferences, forum meetings, competitions, celebrations, convocation, annual camps, special programmes etc.,

#### **Decision making Committees:**

Decision making committees comprises of Principal as the Chairperson, IQAC functionaries, Dean of respective cell, Senior faculty members, UG and PG students from Arts, Science and Commerce. The names of committees itself denote the role and responsibility of the same; they are Admission Committee, Library Advisory Committee, Sports committee, Hostel Committee, Appeal and Grievance Redressal Committee, Students welfare committee, Anti-ragging committee, Women Cell, Examination Committee, Research committee, Finance committee and Alumna Committee.

#### 6.1.2 The institution practices decentralization and participative management

#### **Case Study:**

#### Decentralisation and participative management:

All the members of the college collectively involve and own responsibility. It is the bottom-up approach that determines the functioning of the college. As such the college promotes a culture of participative management for organizational effectiveness. There is a functional decentralization by establishing IQAC with Coordinator, Joint Coordinator, Vice Principal, COE-CIA, Deans, HODs and Office Superintendent. They act according to the collective decisions of the college management committee. Thus the decentralization ensures democracy and transparency in all activities.

Delegation of responsibility by way of dividing the task achieve doubling of the success is the effective policy in the college. It is evidently given in the calendar and it is in practice. Starting from giving advertisement and subsequently for Admission, bridge course, Students Orientation Programme, Faculty Orientation Programme, accountability, reaching the target, setting next target, keeping the standard and quality care, effective management, cost optima, brand establishing, review through feedback analysis, monitoring towards achieving vision, mission and objectives of the institution are meticulously followed. The organogram of our institution clearly depicts the typical decentralization and participative management of the institution.

#### Decentralisation and participative management:

#### **Policy Plan and Practice:**

The Principal and the Members of IQAC carries out analysis on matters related to the institution and its functioning. Reports by departments, associations and suggestion of stakeholders are useful for making policies and planning for the future. The college has a staff council which constitutes Principal, IQAC, HODs and course coordinators of all disciplines that meet regularly/on need basis to monitor routine working. These discussions help to promote effective coordination vertically and horizontally. Similarly, each department has a departmental committee to discuss the departmental issues and student related development programmes. The inputs of departments are discussed by the IQAC and the staff council. The students and alumnae feedback are also analysed and necessary steps are taken. The Principal meets

individual staff members and discusses the feedback and about the areas that need further attention.

#### **Academinc Leadership**

The academic leadership consists of Principal, IQAC, HODs, and Faculty members as counsellors/mentors. In addition, provision of leadership is honoured to hold:

#### **Culture of Participative Management**

a. All decisions pertaining to Academics, Student Affairs and faculty are taken in consultation with the various committees of the college.

b. The decisions taken at the Management Committee are conveyed to the Principal, who constitutes different committees involving faculty members for effective implementation of the decisions taken.

c. The perspective institutional plan is developed through consultations of the Management with Principal and faculty.

d. Teachers play a significant role in the planning and implementation of day-to-day affairs of the college.

e. Student's participation is involved wherever necessary. Student's representatives are ear marked for every committee.

f. The institution values the opinions and needs of the students. The staff and students interact with the Principal and various committee members carry out the tasks assigned. This helps to groom the leadership at various levels.

The Principal, the academic head of the institution, personally conveys adequate information to the college Secretary every day. To others, it is through regular meetings and through circulars to Staff Council, IQAC and student council.

Daily morning assembly is also used for communicating day to day and weekly plan of the college activities. Adequate information is gathered through effective feedback questionnaires on teaching and learning, infrastructure, curricular aspects, campus environment and library - from the Students, Alumni, and the Faculty by the Principal and is forwarded to the management and stake holders.

Principal conducts faculty review meeting and interacts for enhancing their teaching skills. Principal recognizes noteworthy performances of the faculty and appreciates them in meetings. The staff members are given free hand to adopt best practices at all levels for the development of the institution and their self development but always in healthy liaison with HOD and HOI.

# 6.2.2 Organizational structure of the institution including governing body, administrative setup, and functions of various bodies, service rules, procedures, recruitment, promotional policies as well as grievance redressal mechanism

#### Answer:

**a.** Functions of various bodies – Role of the top management: The management consults the Principal for all academic and administrative matters. It participates in the IQAC discussions regarding quality care. It provides effective leadership to enhance quality and performance of the institution. Management committee meets once in a year. The matters in the agenda are discussed in the committee which includes academic plans for the year, academic results of the students, annual budget, fee structure, proposals to be submitted (to the UGC, University, AICTE, NIRF, DCE) infrastructure requirements, appointments and audited statement of accounts. The management meets the stakeholders of the institution and gets the feedback and are duly considered for the overall development of the institution. The management motivates, empowers and encourages the Principal and faculty members to enhance their performance in discharging duties. Management through CME (Continuous Moral Education) inculcates moral values and help students and staff in their spiritual growth through value education programme. Management ensures the safety of faculty and students by employing well trained and committed vigilant security staff.

**b.Service rules**—Being the self-finance college the service rules are flexible. On appointment it is obligatory for the candidates have to serve a minimum of one year to avoid the academic distractions. In case of need of relief, the faculty members have to submit 3 months' notice. According to the requirements the vacant posts are filled up by the following procedure.

#### c. Recruitment procedures:

Candidates who apply on advertisement and other means are called for the preliminary selection by inviting advance CV. On the day of interview, the screened out candidates are exposed to lecture demonstration before the selection committee on specific topics from their respective disciplines.

Teaching ability is assessed with five different parameters including depth, clarity, flow, communication skill, body language, publications, participations etc.,On the basis of teaching ability/proficiency the earmarked candidates are instructed to face the personal interview along with original certificates and credentials. The candidates who prefer our system are recruited for service.

#### d. Promotional policies:

As per University guidelines, the candidates are appointed as Assistant Professors. Those with standard qualifications as prescribed by UGC they are given next cadre as Associate Professor on the basis of Performance Appraisal Report with PhD along SET or NET.

**Grievance redressal mechanism:** The responsibility of the cell is to look into the problems / suggestions presented by any student /staff and analyze it genuinely. It is empowered to look into the matters of indifference. Anyone with a genuine grievance may approach any officer of the cell. Grievances may also be dropped in writing at the complaint/grievance/suggestion box of the grievance cell. Students' Grievance and Appeal committee has the Principal as the chairperson along IQAC officers, senior faculty as members and with student representatives from UG and PG. The committee discusses the appeals of the students and makes suitable recommendations to other committees or the authorities concerned for redressal.

The college being 32 years old, due to inexplicable setback the strength of the college was reduced to a meagre three digit number. The campus being a well-defined with all basic and essential infrastructures was felt under utilized. The college is spread over to 50 acres with Science block, Tamil block, Commerce block, English block, Dairy, Hostel block and a mammoth assembly hall and Mani mandapam. Further the children of neighbouring villages were not affordable to pay high fees in other institutions. This, the college had sensed through the rural camps conducted by National Service Scheme in the nearby adopted villages. With the constant discussion and rapport with many panchayat leaders, self-help group leaders, collected the demand and understood the actual requirement. Among the needy people, the population of SC/ST is also reasonable. By 2008-09 a special committee of the management and faculty members had

an intensive review meeting to boost the admission. There by decided to provide total exemption of first semester fee for all students admitted in the first year and also to higher scorers for the second year of degree courses too. In addition single parent and no parent children too were given free accommodation in the hostel. Many entrepreneurial courses are also provided. From there on, the strength was increased from 137 in 2007-2008 to 757 in 2016-17.

#### Solid waste management

1. Red bins are used to manage plastic and glass wastes and green bins for disposing decomposable wastes.

2. Students are encouraged to use bins for disposing plastic waste.

3. The house keeping teams are instructed to sort and dispose the natural, plastic and glass materials separately.

- 4. The kitchen wastes are disposed in the organic pit.
- 5. The food waste are used in the dairy.

6. The dry leaves from the plants and trees are used for mulching.

7. The pruned tree falls are used for vermicomposting.

### Liquid waste management

1. The Kitchen waste water is used for kitchen garden.

2. The water used in the hostel is used for the cultivation of dairy fodder in the field farm.

3. The runaway water due to rain is channelized to the pond with big irrigation canal.

### **E-Waste Management**

1. Use of re-writable CDs.

2. Worn-out active and passive components like transistor, Field effect transistors, resistors, capacitors are used for demonstration in the practical and theory classes.

3 .The broken and dissipated glass wares are collected and buried in one area designated at the corner of the campus.

4. The systems in computer lab which is not in use is used for demonstration for Students (Motherboard, RAM,CD-Drive,etc)

5. The e-wastes are sorted out and disposed through public vendors.

6. It is proposed to have waste management MOU with Redington Foundation Chennai and Tamilnadu Pollution Control Board from 2018-19.

Prayer for Harmonious Development of the student

### Objectives

To improve Self-control and the power of concentration

To inculcate the moral values.

To develop positive thinking.

To develop listening skill and decision making skill.

### The Context

Since inception our college insists on the Harmonious development of the Hand, the Heart and the Head. Spiritual wisdom is essential to cultivate a balanced mind. Consequently, one learns to cultivate selfcontrol, discriminate between what is eternal and transient, practice equanimity and follow one's own dharma. Dharma requests one to perform the duties of life in accordance with universal ethical values.

### The Practice

1. **Daily routine** starts with a common prayer

2. . Our prayer sessions act as a catalyst for the development of self knowledge.

3. The **practice of prayer** intensifies our faith, nourishes our hope, and trains us to center ourselves in our relationships with the divine.

4. Students are trained to come orderly and silently into the prayer hall.

5.Students are made to sit in the right posture in a straight line which is a yoga practice.

6. Students are brought into the **spiritual wave** by chanting Namavali.

7. Students sing Spiritual, Patriotic, Motivational and Inspiring songs. Music is also very good breathing **exercise for the lungs** as lot of oxygen is inhaled while singing loudly.

8. The motivational group songs, rhythm, melody and the joint chorus create a **positive and energetic** force in the minds of the students.

9. The most powerful hymn **Gayathri** mantra is chanted to boost the mental and physical health of the students.

10. The plants and trees in the sacred garden near prayer hall bloom beautifully and spread the

aroma around us.

11. **Daily meditation** for 2 minutes practiced by the students enhances the concentration power.

12. Sharing of practical experience mingled with divine wisdom is poured into the heart and soul of the students through the reading of **Daily Divine Digest** and *Dhinasary Dhyanam* in Tamil (Thought for the day).

7. The successes attained by SaradaNandhini are the live examples for the successes of our Prayer.

### **Problems Encountered and Resources Required:**

At initial stages

- $\circ$   $\;$  Some of the students unable to do prayer with concentration.
- $\circ$  They feel sleepy during prayer.
- They find difficult to sit on the floor.
- They felt hesitated to stand before assembly for telling stories.

• But as they get practice, in due course of time they realize the benefits and the positive outcomes of the prayer which helps them to continue it without hesitation.

### 7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

### 7.3.1 Describe/Explain the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust

### Answer:

- Uniform: A multi-fold ideal, unique and healthy practice by the college is adherence of different coloured (Green-UG, Pink-PG) saree uniforms by different levels of students. This helps in:
  - a) providing safety, security and identity in the society
  - b) recognition, respect and honor amongst peers

c) Economy for the parents. (2 or 3 sets suffice/year - poor people could not afford to have many sets of modern dresses)

d) Saree is a traditional women wear with Indian culture and tradition is followed meticulously. Amidst media prone modern dresses, the **green uniform** exhibit unity, strength,harmony,system, vibration and peace leading to progress and bliss. Green is the colour of life, renewal, nature, and energy associated with meanings of growth, harmony, freshness, safety, fertility, and environment.

- **PadaPooja** is performed by the students to their parents. The blessings of their parents can act as a shield which protects them from all the evils and shower all the goodness to them. Holy Scripture proclaim *Mathru devobhava; Pithru devobhava; acharya devobhava* and *athithi devobhava*.
- English News Papers are provided to the students on special occasions to promote reading habit, enrich knowledge on current affairs and also to develop their fluency in English.
- **Student's Research Activities** are initiated by the Research and Development Cell of our college by motivating the students to do projects on their respective fields even though the University scrapped the academic projects.

**Traditional Art Forms alone** (Bharatha Natyam, Carnatic Music, and writings of great people and scenes from Ramayana, Mahabharatha and similar literature) are enacted during the celebrations of our college while performing Dance, Music and Drama.

**Sanskrit as a language:** Language is the base for the culture of the society. Many Philosophical, scientific and literary works have been composed in Sanskrit. Recitation of Sanskrit hymns has a relaxing effect in the mind. Certificate course in Spoken Sanskrit, and Samskrita Sambhashana Shibiram (Conversation in Sanskrit) are conducted for the students to learn, speak, read and write in Sanskrit.

**Students Self Study Scheme (4S):** Each student is instructed to read books on their area of interest (one in academic and another in extra- academic field). To ensure this the students are asked to submit their review write-up on the books to their class counselors. This practice empowers their reading, writing and communication skills.

**Readers Forum for Students:** This forum meets periodically and members of this forum discuss the review on a book recently they read. By this within a short span of time, each member experiences the perception of authors in each book.
